A MEDITATION ON RECEIVING COMMUNION

Many of us receive Holy Communion; this is something we should do thoughtfully and in the full knowledge of what we are doing, what we are asking for, and what we are entering into. When we take Holy Communion we are calling upon the Lord to become one with



us in such a way that His life becomes our life and our life becomes His life, not only in our souls but in our very flesh. Therefore when we have received Holy Communion, whenever we commit deeds of darkness it is as if we are cruelly forcing the Lord to travel with us the very path along which He himself was led during the days of his Passion, to crucifixion, to suffering, to desecration - this we must remember. On the other hand, from the Lord we seek life, a new life, a life of abundance, and this life is given to us, because when the Lord comes to us and makes us one with Him, eternal life conquers us and enters into us. But we do not accept the life which is given to us; we want to rejoice in it but we do not want to assume its burden - for in this eternal life on earth there is a burden, and there is a tragic side, and not only triumphant joy. On the one hand we begin to live the life of a future age, but that life only takes hold in us

when we desist from evil deeds, from a life of darkness, decay and death, when we move away from them consciously, by an effort of will, by showing no mercy to ourselves, to our weakness, and, life within ourselves as an evangelical life, that is, by means of deeds which are not a desecration of life, and by prayer.


There is another aspect: we pray to the Lord to become one with us and to take upon Himself all the burden of our life and to bear that burden together with us, but at the same time we must be ready to take upon ourselves the fate of the Son of God incarnate on earth, to belong to heaven, to God, to the truth, with all the consequences which may ensue: firstly, the internal struggle with falsehood and death which are within us; then the willingness to stand up for the truth of the Lord, for the mystery of the Kingdom of Heaven, the love of God on earth in His relations with mankind, even when this means making some kind of sacrifice, sacrificing ourselves; and, finally, the duty to be willing in the name of God and His truth to be cast out, cut off, to be alienated from all those who – consciously or otherwise – rise up against that truth.

Therefore in taking Holy Communion we will prepare ourselves carefully and intently, and we will prepare ourselves so that we may come knowingly to confession, to renounce the falsehood within us, to turn away from everything which could hold sway over us, but we will also prepare ourselves so that after confession and becoming one with Christ we can begin to live a new life, whatever it may cost us. If we act in this way, then the gift of Holy Communion, becoming one with Christ, the entering into us of the grace of the Holy Spirit, those new indescribable relations which are created between us and the Father, and in God with everyone, will bear fruit. Otherwise we will be downcast because when we turn to God we remain helpless and powerless – not because God does not help, and not because we have no strength, but because that which God gives to us we squander in life's wilderness.

Therefore let us now come to a new life with joy, both those who have received Communion and those for whom this indescribable triumph and joy still await, and we will live in such a way that through us heaven will be with us here on earth. The Kingdom of God within us will conquer everything around us, from the smallest to the greatest.



MEETS ON THURSDAYS IN FEBRUARY AT 7:30 PM!



We are exploring how the Psalms and Proverbs are used liturgically by our Holy Church and how they both apply to our day-to-day life as Christians. Thomas Hopko of blessed memory, "Virtually all states of man's soul before God are found expressed in the psalms: praising, thanking, blessing, rejoicing, petitioning, repenting, lamenting, questioning and even com-

plaining. . . In the Orthodox Church all of the psalms are understood as having their deepest and most genuine spiritual meaning in terms of Christ and His mission of eternal salvation. . . . The Proverbs are short sayings concerning the proper conduct of wise and righteous persons. They are read in their entirety at the weekday Vesper services of the Church during Great Lent. Selections from the Proverbs are also read at the vigils of a number of feasts of the Church since for Christians the Wisdom of God is personified and embodied in Christ." 
CHRISTIAN EDUCATION & SPIRITUAL FORMATION

THE WOMEN'S STUDY FELLOWSHIP WILL MEET AT 11AM ON MONDAY, FEBRUARY 12th and FEBRUARY 26th!



The Women's Study Fellowship is discussing a new book: Seven Holy Women: Conversations with Saints and Friends that introduces the reader to the lives of seven female saints: Saints Morwenna of Cornwall, Kassiane of Constantinople, Ia of Cornwall, Nino the Enlightener of Georgia, Piama, Margaret and Casilda of Toledo. Each section of the book includes a story from one saint's life, told vividly and imaginatively in the second person; additional information about the saint to give her context; a reflection on ways the writer, reader, and saint intersect on their journeys; personal surveys for the reader and a friend to complete; and a journal prompt that encourages the reader to explore and document her encounter with themes from the saint's life. Created as both a deeply personal and enriching communal experience, Seven Holy Women speaks directly to the reader, drawing her into the lives of seven saints as it invites the reader to look more closely and lovingly at her own spiritual journey and her friendship with the cloud of witnesses. THE WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY WILL MEET ON THURSDAY MORNINGS IN FEBRUARY AT 10AM

The Women's Bible Study is studying the Acts of the Apostles! St. Luke the Evangelist was a close friend and travel companion of the apostle Paul on his second and third great missionary journeys throughout the Mediterranean world, a Gentile probably born in the city of Antioch, and a medical doctor by profession. He is also the author of two books in the New Testament: the Gospel that bears his name and is focused on the life of Christ and the Acts of the Apostles, the companion volume to his Gospel, which outlines the history of the earliest apostolic Churches beginning in Jerusalem and then spreading throughout the ancient Roman Empire. Imprisoned in Rome, near the end of his life, the apostle Paul wrote to Timothy that "Luke is my only companion." Luke also emphasizes the activity of the Holy Spirit, who is active both in the life of Christ and in the earliest Christian communities as recorded in the Acts of the Apostles, beginning with the day of Pentecost. Luke is also known in the Christian tradition as one of the first painters of icons and was martyred at the age of 84 near Thebes, Greece.





STEWARDSHIP—GIVING TO CHRIST AND HIS CHURCH

On February 19, 2024, we observe Presidents' Day when we remember all those who served as presidents of the United States. As Orthodox Christians we are asked to do far more. **The Divine**



Liturgy of Saint John Chrysostom tells us to pray for "our country, the president, all those in public service." This call to prayer is **based on 1 Timothy 2:1-4** where the Apostle Paul exhorts "...first of all that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving of thanks be made for all men, for kings and all who are in authority, that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and reverence. For this is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior, who desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth." When this letter was written, people could not vote. Christians were

subjected to whomever was in charge and life was often difficult as Christians faced persecution. And yet the writer reminds them of what they can do: pray for their leaders so that the community of Christians could live their lives reverently. They are not to lose focus of God's desire: to see salvation come to all and that all may "come to the knowledge of the truth."

While our situation today is not anywhere close to what Christians in the first century faced, we are subject to leaders such as presidents, governors, and mayors, all of whom can make decisions that affect the world both in favorable and unfavorable ways. We must therefore, like the first century Christians, pray for our leaders as well so that we too may live our lives reverently and not lose our focus on God's desire to see the message of salvation be made known to all people today. As members of St. Paul's we have an important role in making God's message known to others. Through our ministries within our parish and through ministries that operate throughout the world and by making love our aim, people hear about the love of Jesus Christ. Your giving of your time, your abilities, and your financial contributions help make this **happen.** Our Stewardship Team is grateful for



ORTHODOX CHRISTIANITY 101 MEETS ON WEDNESDAYS IN FEBRUARY AT 7PM!

OC101, taught by Father Steve and Mark Nauroth, meets at 7PM in the Education Building in the Father George Stephanides Library. The purpose of this class is to provide a broad overview of the Church's faith and life, beginning with our worship. In February, we're studying the history of the Church, looking specifically at the question: where did all the many thousands of different denominations come from? 
NEWS FLASH





"From Ruin to Redemption" is an engaging, accessible, thematic Bible study which teaches younger generations of Orthodox Christians how to read the Bible within the Apostolic Tradition of the



Church. At every meeting we'll dive into a key passage of the Bible and explore how it develops themes that run from creation and exile in the Old Testament to the Lord Jesus's incarnation, life, death, resurrection, and ascension in the New Testament. We connect the biblical story to the daily lives that younger generations of Christians experience in 21st century America a time where young people are acutely aware of the effects that a ruined social environment and a ruined natural environment have led to. By creating these connections we hope to recognize the fact that the Lord Jesus has entered into each one of our stories to redeem each one of us. Please join us in learning to understand the Bible and getting closer to Christ!





The Saint John Chrysostom Oratorical Festival is an opportunity for our young people to learn more about their faith and to be able to articulate that understanding. The Oratorical Festival takes place yearly in Greek Orthodox parishes throughout the United States. At Saint Paul's, it has also become a tradition to include a non-competitive Elementary Division for 3rd-6th grades, joining our 7th-12th grade speakers. This year, our Parish Festival will take place on Sunday, March 31, at 11:30 in the Education Center Multipurpose Room. It is not too soon for our students to begin thinking about their presentations now. The topics and research helps for grades 7-12 are found on the metropolis Oratorical website: https://SForatorical.net. Students in the Elementary Division may speak on any topic of their choice, with a recommended length of 1 minute to 90 seconds. Junior and Senior division speakers will follow the guidelines on the oratorical website. Two speakers in each of the Junior and Senior divisions will represent Saint Paul's in the District Festival in April. From there, one Junior and Senior speaker will move on to the Metropolis festival which will take place in May. We ask parents to encourage their students to take part in a valuable component of our religious education program. It will involve a minimal amount of their time, but the rewards can last a lifetime! Teachers in our 3rd through 6th grade classes will be assisting their students with topics and prompts. Additional assistance with grammar and pubic speaking tips will be offered to students in grades 7-12 who express an interest in speaking at the Oratorical Festival. 
